## Vuk Jeremić

Président du Center for International Relations and Sustainable Development



Mr. Vuk Jeremić is the President of the Center for International Relations and Sustainable Development (CIRSD), a global public policy think-tank based in Belgrade, and Editor-in-Chief of the quarterly magazine Horizons – Journal of International Relations and Sustainable Development. He is also the leader of Serbia's opposition People's Party.

In 2016, Mr. Jeremić participated in the official election for UN Secretary-General. After six rounds of voting in the UN Security Council, he finished in second place, behind Mr. António Guterres.

In June 2012, he was directly elected by the majority of world's nations to be the President of the 67th session of the UN General Assembly, in the first contested vote since the end of the Cold War. During his term in office, he played a leading role in steering the UN towards the establishment of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

He served as Serbia's Minister of Foreign Affairs from 2007 to 2012. In 2007, he chaired the Council of Europe's Committee of Ministers. In 2011 and 2012, he led Serbia's successful campaign for the Chairmanship-in-Office of the Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe (OSCE) for the year 2015.

He has lectured at major universities, think-tanks, and institutes around the world, as well as publishing opinion pieces in leading outlets including New York Times, Washington Post, Wall Street Journal and Financial Times.

Mr. Jeremić holds a bachelor's degree in Theoretical and Experimental Physics from Cambridge University and a master's degree in Public Administration/International Development from Harvard University's John F. Kennedy School of Government.

He was named a Young Global Leader by the World Economic Forum in 2013 and appointed to the Leadership Council of the United Nations Sustainable Development Solutions Network (UN SDSN) in 2014.

He served as the President of the Serbian Tennis Federation from 2011 to 2015.
