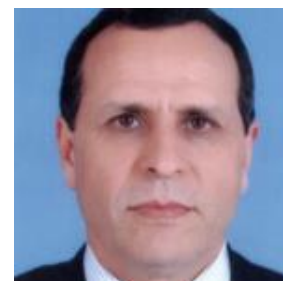


## Aziz Ajbilou

Secretary General of the Ministry of General affairs and Governance



After getting his degree as a statistician in INSEA in Rabat, he joined “l’Université Catholique de Louvain-La-Neuve” in Belgium to get PhD in Demography in 1997. He came back as a grade C professor at INSEA and the director of the Center for Demographic Research and studies (2001-2006).

He was director of Studies, Cooperation and legislation on Social Economy from 2006 to 2013 at the Ministry of Economic and General Affairs. He moved to being Secretary General of the Ministry Delegate to the Head of Government in charge of General Affairs and Governance since 2015. In addition, he took charge of many partnership projects with international organisations such as UNFPA, UNDP, UNICEF, OCDE, ONUFEM, World Bank, etc. His publications are mostly about social economy, demography, poverty and development, and youth.

He participated in many studies related to Regional Development Plans of Social Economy in many regions of Morocco. Those were focused on income-generating activities. He also has studies on social protection, the evaluation of public policies, the establishment of an information system relating to the monitoring of public policies, compensation reform, risk management, corporate governance, business climate etc. and responsible for several field surveys (youth, poverty, migration, elderly, cooperatives and associations, etc.).

He is a member of the Scientific Committee that wrote the “50 years of Human Development and 2025 Perspective in Morocco” and many publications on the national and international level.

He is a member of many associations such as the European Network of Cities and Regions and the Social Economy (REVES); the Association of Moroccan Demographers (1996-2000); the Democracy Network Committee of the “Agence Universitaire de la Francophonie” (AUF); the International Union for the Scientific Study of Population (IUSSP); the Union for the Study of the African Population (UEPA) and the Maghreb Association for Population Studies (AMEP).
